THE WINGED LION OF VENICE AND SAINT MARK

If you have ever visited Venice in north-eastern Italy, you will have seen the Winged Lion is everywhere: it is emblazoned on the front of Saint Mark's Basilica, on top of the famous column in Saint Mark's Square, and on the flag of the city itself, amongst many other places.



This Winged Lion is derived from Saint Mark's description of John the Baptist as: "The voice of the one who cries in the wilderness: prepare a way for the Lord": artists have often compared Mark's description to 'a roaring lion'. The lion's 'wings' come from the book of the Prophet Ezekiel (Ezk 1), where he has a vision of four winged creatures: an eagle, ox, lion and a man, which are often applied to the four Evangelists: eagle - John, ox - Luke, lion - Mark and the man - Matthew.

According to a Venetian legend, that while travelling in Europe, Mark, having arrived at Venice, was met by an angel

who said to him: "Pax tibi Marce, evangelista meus. Hic requiescet corpus tuum." (Peace be with you, Mark, my evangelist. Here your body will rest). This legend was used as the justification for bringing, by stealth, Mark's remains to Venice from Alexandria in Egypt. He became patron saint of Venice and his life and death are depicted in a series of mosaics in Saint Mark's Basilica where he is interred.

Mark's feast day falls on Thursday of this week. But who was Saint Mark? John Mark, later known simply as Mark, was Jewish by birth, the son of Mary who owned the Upper Room where Our Lord celebrated the Last Supper. Gethsemane, a small Garden estate, outside the old city walls of Jerusalem, belonged to Mark's family too. The scholars traditionally identify him with the young man mentioned in the Gospel of Mark, who was sleeping in Gethsemane when Jesus was arrested: "he had nothing on but a linen cloth; they caught hold of him, but he left the cloth in their hands and ran away naked." (Mark 14).

He is also mentioned several times in the Acts of the Apostles: in chapter 12, when Saint Peter escaped from prison, we are told that "He went straight to the house of Mary the mother of John Mark in Jerusalem, where a number of people had assembled and were praying". Later, that he accompanied Paul and Barnabas (Mark's cousin), as they travelled from Syria to Cyprus and Turkey. However, Mark was perhaps too immature or too delicate for the hardships that this type of work brought with it and left them at Perga in Turkey to return home (Acts 13).

In 50AD, as Paul and Barnabas were preparing for their second missionary journey, Barnabas wanted to bring Mark with them again, but Paul objected. So, Mark and Barnabas left Paul and journeyed to Cyprus (Acts 15). Time would heal Mark's strained relationship with Paul, and during his period of house arrest in Rome (61-63AD), Mark helped Paul (Colossians 4 and Philemon 2), and the Apostle learned to appreciate him again. Later, when Paul was arrested for a second time, he requested Mark's help, which he generously gave (2 Timothy 4).

Mark would write his Gospel about 50AD. It is the shortest of the four gospels. Written for Roman Gentile converts - he is careful to explain Jewish customs and words. Mark acted as the interpreter for Saint Peter, who affectionally refers to him as his "son" (1 Pet 5). His Gospel is sometimes called the 'Gospel of Peter': effectively, it is Peter's reminiscences of the life and teachings of Our Lord. This explains why incidents which involve Peter are described in greater detail. According to tradition, Peter sent Mark as Bishop to Alexandria which, after Rome, was the second city of the Empire. Here he died a martyr's death.

Mark's Gospel can be read from beginning and to end in a couple of hours. Why not read a few chapters each day this week? Mindful of the words of Saint Jerome, written in the 5th century: "Ignorance of Scripture is ignorance of Christ". Use the opportunity to get to know Our Lord better through the writings of Saint Mark. **Father McGachey**

GOOD SHEPHERD SUNDAY

Today, the Fourth Sunday of Eastertide, is sometimes called 'Good Shepherd Sunday', because today's Gospel, from Saint John's account of Our Lord's life, always highlights the image of the Shepherd. The Good Shepherd is closely associated with the Priesthood, since the priest is in a special way like the shepherd of the flock entrusted to his care. For this reason, today is the World Day of Prayer for Vocations to the Priesthood, and in many dioceses around the world, there are ordinations.

We rejoice because Motherwell Diocese had an Ordination last week in Rome of Deacon Chris Furmage (Saint Augustine's, Coatbridge). In addition to Deacon Chris, we have a number of seminarians in formation: Kieran Burt (Saint Joseph's, Blantyre), Chris Igwe (Our Lady of Lourdes, East Kilbride), Aidan Kelly (Saint Ninian's, Hamilton) and Matthew O'Neill (Saint Mary's, Coatbridge). They study in Rome and in Birmingham. With Roman Catholics around the world today, please pray earnestly to the Good Shepherd for an increase in vocations to Priesthood, particularly in our own Diocese, and pray for those who will serve him in the future.

RETIRING COLLECTION FOR THE EDUCATION OF OUR SEMINARIANS
