# LET NOTHING TROUBLE YOU...GOD ALONE SUFFICES

hese words are taken from a prayer that was written on a bookmark, found among the possessions of the Spanish Carmelite nun, Saint Teresa of Avila (+1582), whose feast day falls on Wednesday this week. She was canonised in 1622, along with three compatriots: Ignatius Loyola (founder of the Jesuits), Francis Xavier (a Jesuit missionary), Isidore the Farmer (Patron of Madrid) and the Italian priest and founder of the Oratorians, Saint Philip Neri.

Teresa was born in 1515 in Avila, northwest of Spain. When she was seven, she ran away from home with her brother Rodrigo. in the hope of being martyred by the Moors; she said that this would allow her to see God face to face. Her mother died when she was fourteen,



and she asked Our Lady's maternal protection. She entered the Carmelite Order, at the Convent of the Incarnation, when she was eighteen. For nearly twenty years, she lived a comfortable life, despite bouts of physical illness and spiritual dryness. In fact, she was often in two minds about whether to abandon the religious life.

However, in 1555, she experienced what she called a "second conversion". Teresa felt that in a large community of around 150 nuns (many of whom had their personal servants), the distractions were too many and made it impossible to cultivate a deep

spiritual life. Teresa envisaged much smaller communities, of about 12 sisters, praying together, doing penance, observing strict enclosure and returning to the simplicity lived by the first Carmelites in the thirteenth century.

With the help of Saint John of the Cross, she founded her first reformed convent (called 'Discalced' [unshod] Carmelite) in Avila in 1562. The Carmelite Prior General approved her reforms and encouraged her to found more convents for women and men. The unreformed Carmelites (called the 'Calced' [shod]) resented her reforms; they even captured and imprisoned her friend and ally Saint John.

Teresa's writings include her bestselling autobiographical *Life*, as well as two mystical classics: *The Interior Castle* and *The Way of Perfection*, as well as many letters. Because she lived what she wrote, she is as popular with lay people as she is with religious and theologians. Her life and her achievements have earned her many titles - reformer, writer, foundress, doctor of the Church and saint - and these, together with her warm human personality, her wit and her single-minded courage, have made her one of the greatest women of all time. She had a profound devotion to Saint Joseph, whose popularity spread throughout the Church thanks to her efforts. Although her health was broken, Teresa continued her travels for reform and to found until her death in 1582. Her holy body rests above the high altar of the Carmelite church in Alba de Tormes, near Salamanca, Spain.

### HONOURING OUR LADY IN OCTOBER...MONTH OF THE ROSARY



On Monday evening at 7pm, we will have the second of our **October Devotions** in honour of Our Lady for the month of the Holy Rosary. We will offer our prayers this week for the special intention of peace.

The service will include: a Torchlight Procession, the recitation of the Rosary, the Litany of Loreto, the prayer to Saint Joseph for the Universal Church and Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament, accompanied with the organ and the use of incense. Please join us as we honour the Mother of God during this

special month. On the Mondays of October, we will not recite the Rosary before 10am Mass, since it will be said in the evening, but have a quiet time of adoration of the Blessed Sacrament for personal prayer instead.

### **FATHER MARTIN**

Father Martin is on pilgrimage in the Holy Land until Saturday of this week.

### CALENDAR

Tuesday is the memorial of Saint Callistus (+223), Pope and Martyr. He was a Christian slave of Rome who became the guardian of the cemetery on the Appian Way. Elected pope, his charitable attitude toward repentant sinners incurred the wrath of rigorists, and he was martyred in the persecutions of Alexander Severus. Wednesday is the feast of Saint Teresa of Avila (+1588) - see front cover. On Thursday we remember Saint Margaret Mary Alacoque (+1690), to whom Our Lord revealed his Sacred Heart and made a series of promises for those who would keep the First Fridays. Friday is the memorial of Saint Ignatius of Antioch (+107), a disciple of Saint John the apostle, who was condemned to be killed by wild beasts in Rome. On his journey there in chains, he wrote seven letters to local churches, which provide us with a important snapshot of the Church of this day. Saturday is the feast of Saint Luke, evangelist and physician.
