# A MAN FOR ALL SEASONS...

Today, 22<sup>nd</sup> June, were it not the Feast of the Body of Blood Christ, we would be remembering the life and times of Saint Thomas More, lawyer, author and statesman who was martyred for opposing King Henry VIII.

Thomas More was born in 1478, at Milk Street in the City of London, just behind the original Saint Paul's Cathedral which was destroyed by the Great Fire of London in 1666. He was the second of six children born to Sir John More, a distinguished Lawyer and Judge and his wife Agnes. He attended one of most prestigious schools of the day, Saint Anthony's on Threadneedle Street, the home to the Bank of England today. After leaving school, he worked for two years in the office of the John Morton, Archbishop of Canterbury, at Lambeth Palace, across the river from the Houses of Parliament.



The archbishop, seeing that Thomas had great potential, sent him to Oxford University. Here, More received a well-rounded education, becoming the typical 'renaissance man': he learned several languages, both ancient and modern, and was well versed in mathematics, music and literature. However, his father withdrew him from the University, insisting that he study for the Bar, which he was called to in 1502.

As a young man, More, despite his legal studies, was uncertain regarding his true vocation in life: he seriously considered joining the strict Carthusian Order as a monk. He would settle rather on

living a spiritual life, in the world, by observing regular fasting; he wore of hair shirt everyday as a penance, and regular prayer, all of which he saw as a means to growing in holiness.

In 1504, he was elected member of Parliament for Great Yarmouth, and he married Jane Colt. Together they had four children: three girls and a boy. But tragedy struck when Jane died in their sixth year of marriage. More remarried thirty days after her funeral; his new wife, Alice Middleton, loved him and the children, while Thomas in his turn was generous husband and father. He became MP for Poole in Dorset and then for Henley in West London.

More became friends with Erasmus of Rotterdam (+1536), the renowned as a humanist scholar, and published a whole series of books, including his most famous, *Utopia*, in 1516 - More coined the word 'utopia', to mean either a "good place" or "no place": the premise of the book is an ideal imaginary island whose political system he describes in detail, with God at the centre of everything.

More's work in Parliament attracted the attention of King Henry VIII, who appointed him Speaker of the House of Commons (the last Catholic Speaker until Michael Martin in 2000). In 1529 he became Lord Chancellor of England, the official in charge of the English Court System.

Henry wanted his marriage to Catherine of Aragon, annulled, but Pope Clement VII declared to be valid and indissoluble. By 1532, More had resigned as Lord Chancellor, refusing to


support the king's efforts to defy the Pope. In 1534, Henry VIII declared that every subject of the British crown would have to swear an oath affirming the validity of his new marriage to Anne Boleyn, refusal to do this would be regarded as treason.

More, while accepting certain portions of the Act, could not accept the king's defiance of Papal authority on the marriage question. More was imprisoned in the Tower of London, and, while in jail, an Act of Parliament came into effect declaring Henry VIII to be "the only supreme head on earth of the Church in England."

In June of 1535, More was formally tried for the crime of treason in Westminster Hall. He was charged with opposing the king's Act of Supremacy. It took just fifteen minutes to find him guilty, and he was sentenced to death by hanging, the usual punishment for traitors, but the King commuted it to decapitation. He told the court that he could not go against his conscience and wished his judges that "we may merrily meet in heaven again."

On the 6<sup>th</sup> July 1532, as he was being led to the scaffold, he cried out to the crowd that he was dying "the King's good servant, but God's servant first." His head was placed on London Bridge but later returned to his daughter Margaret who preserved it as a holy relic. In 2000, Pope Saint John Paul II, declared More the Patron of Statesmen and Politicians.

Robert Bolt's play, 'A Man For All Seasons', which he adapted for the big screen, captures beautifully the life of More. Bolt borrowed the title from Robert Whittington (+1553). a contemporary of More, who in 1520 wrote: "More is a man of an angel's wit and singular learning. I know not his peer. For where is the man of that same gentleness, lowliness and affability? And, as circumstances require, a man of marvellous mirth and pastimes, and sometime of as sad gravity. A man for all seasons." The film is beautifully made and well worth watching if you get the chance over the summer. Father McGachey
