SAINT MARGARET CLITHEROW - "THE PEARL OF YORK"

Tuesday, 25th March, as well as being the Solemnity of the Annunciation, it is the feast day of one the Reformation martyrs of England, Margaret Clitherow. Who was she and why is she a Saint today?

About four hundred years ago, in city of York, there lived a family called Middleton: Thomas, the father, was a chandler or candle maker, and his wife Jane. They had two sons, Thomas and Robert, and two girls, Alice and Margaret, who was born in 1553. When Margaret was five, Queen Elizabeth I came to the throne, and completed the work begun by her father Henry VIII, of making England a truly Protestant nation. The Middletons, like many others, left their Catholicism to the side and embraced the beliefs of the new Church of England.



When Margaret was nineteen, she married John Clitherow, a local butcher. After their marriage they lived in the famous street called the *Shambles* in the heart of York: his shop was on the ground floor, and the family resided in the rooms behind and above. A few weeks' later Margaret became a Catholic - although John attended Sunday services in the new Church of England, he was still a Catholic at heart - one of his brothers was in fact a priest. However to openly confess to being a Catholic would mean fines and possibly imprisonment, and certainly the loss of one's business. Margaret, on the other hand, refused to attend, and was often sent to jail for a few days at a time as a punishment. The Clitherows were blessed with three children: Henry, Anne, and William, and such was Margaret's enthusiasm for her new religion that she raised the children in it too.

Margaret allowed the family home to be used by priests, who were being hunted down by the Queen's soldiers. There they could offer Mass and celebrate the Sacraments. She would allow the clergy to take refuge in the 'priest hole', a hiding place built into the walls of the house and would store the vestments and sacred vessels a secret cupboard. She kept nothing hidden from her children, and it was this openness which bring about her final arrest.

Margaret began to realise the end was near when John was summoned by the Council to explain the prolonged absence of their eldest son, Henry, who had been sent abroad to receive a Catholic education two years earlier. One day, while the Council was questioning John, the Sheriff arrived to search the house. Although Margaret's own children gave nothing away, the Sheriff seized upon a sickly foreign boy who was living with the family at the time, who gave in to his threats, showing him not only the 'priest hole' but the vestments and sacred vessels too. Margaret was immediately arrested and imprisoned; her children would never see her again. In actual fact, Anne, her daughter, would go on to become a nun, while her two sons, William and Henry, became priests.

The Council was intent on finding evidence to use against Margaret, even though she was greatly loved and respected by everyone who knew her. She was not intimidated by the sham trial but filled rather with courage. While she was subjected to much verbal abuse and jeering by the crowds, her husband would not hear a bad word spoken against her, saying "she is the best wife in England, and the best Catholic too." In 1586 she was found guilty of having hidden Jesuit priests in her home and of having allowed Mass to be said there.

She received her death sentence calmly, expecting to be hanged. She was, however, sentenced to a particularly brutal kind of end known as the "peen forte et dure", that is to say: to be laid naked on the floor, blind-folded, with a sharp stone in the small of the back, and then to have a heavy wooden door placed over the body, which would be piled high with heavy stones, forcing the air from the lungs... As the weights were placed upon her, she was heard to say "Jesus! Jesus! Jesus! Have mercy on me!" These were her last words, and a quarter of an hour later she was dead. She was given a secret burial, but six weeks later her grave was located, and her body was found to be incorrupt. Before being given a more worthy burial, the right hand from her body was removed, and is today a precious relic in the Bar Convent in York. Father McGachey

This feast commemorates the moment in time when the Archangel Gabriel was sent by God to Our Lady in Nazareth, inviting her to be the Mother of God's Son. Mary said 'Yes', and our faith teaches us, that by the power of Holy Spirit, she conceived Our Lord in her womb. The feast falls exactly nine months before Christmas. It is a feast of Our Lord and of Our Lady too. The Annunciation is a special day of prayer for the protection and promotion of human life, from womb to tomb.

In place of the Stations of the Cross on Tuesday, we will recite the Joyful mysteries of the Rosary at Our Lady's altar. We will have the organ and incense at 10am Mass on Tuesday morning.

GIFT AID – CAN YOU HELP THE PARISH?

We are almost at the end of the Financial Year, and those of you who use collection envelopes have just about finished your booklets. New envelopes will be delivered to your homes over the next few weeks.

There are lots of people coming to Mass at the weekend at Saint Bride's. You are very generous to the Parish – Father Martin and myself are so grateful for your support. When we empty the collection bags on a Sunday afternoon, there are lots of high value notes. We often wonder: how many of these contributions could have

been Giftaided?

We would encourage you to think seriously about joining the Giftaid Scheme – particularly our younger parishioners. It costs you absolutely nothing - the only qualification is that you pay Income Tax.

Some of you may believe that you are already signed-up to the Giftaid scheme, and in reality you are not. Please check with me if you are in doubt.

This is a very important source of income for the parish, since for every pound you contribute to the collection, we can claim 25p from the Government. Money for nothing!

Last year we earned almost over £22,000 from your contributions. With so many bills to be paid, this helps us face the future with more confidence.

Forms are available on the large table beyond Saint Anthony's statue today, if you would like to sign-up. Leave them in the sacristy as soon as possible.

You can choose to make your contribution by using envelopes, or, if you prefer, to give your weekly offerings through Bank Standing Order.

Perhaps you wish to increase your donation to the Church. This can be arranged too.
