THE EPIPHANY OF THE LORD

'VIDENTES AUTEM STELLAM GAVISI SUNT GAUDIO MAGNO'

'And seeing his Star, they rejoiced with great gladness' Matthew 2,10



When most people have packed away all trace of Christmas for another year, the Church continues her celebration of this holy season with the Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord.

The word *Epiphany*, from the Greek, means 'revelation' - we celebrate Christ's Epiphany to the Gentiles, represented by the Wise Men from the Persia (modern-day Iran and Iraq), whose coming to Bethlehem is told by Saint Matthew in his Gospel, which we will hear read at Mass today.

Tradition says their names were Balthasaar, Gaspar and Melchior, and the came with gifts for the new-born child, gifts which would prefigure his future life: gold for a king, incense for a priest, and myrrh for someone who would suffer and die.

Two thousand years ago, frankincense and myrrh were as familiar as gold, and just as rare. In Jesus' time, one kilogram of gold was worth about £400; today it is worth more than £50,000. Frankincense was worth slightly less, at £300; today a kilogram would cost £40. Myrrh, however, was worth £2,500 per kilogram in those days, but it is valued at around £70 today.

Gold was even rarer in the ancient world than it is today, and because of its incorruptibility, people connected it with immortality and divinity. Frankincense and myrrh are fragrant gum resins that come from trees found in the Middle East. One tree can produce about ten kilos of resin a year. The harvesting methods have not changed in two thousand years - a cut is made in the tree trunk, causing the gum to seep out; it eventually hardens into resin and is scrapped off the bark and collected for use.

Frankincense was the main component of incense - when burned, its aroma was thought to be pleasing to God. It was used in the religious rituals of the peoples of the ancient world. Myrrh means 'bitter' in Arabic. Principally a luxury item, it was used in perfumes, cosmetics and medicine (for indigestion, to heal wounds, as a pain killer...). At the crucifixion, Jesus, wracked with pain, was offered myrrh, mixed wine, but refused it. In fact, Saint Luke the tells us that Christ's body was prepared for burial with a mixture of aloes and myrrh.

We have added the Wise Men figures to the Crib in the Church, and by the side of the Crib we have placed gold, frankincense and myrrh. Please have a look at them up close - smell them, touch them... If you have children, let them do the same!

THE CHRISTMAS SEASON CONTINUES THIS WEEK

Next Sunday is the Solemnity of the Baptism of Our Lord, and the end the Season of Christmas. The Church recalls Our Lord's second 'manifestation' or 'epiphany', which occurred when he was baptised in the river Jordan by his cousin John the Baptist.

In an increasing number of places in Europe and the Americas, it is the now the custom to keep the Crib and the Christmas evergreens in the Church until the 2nd February, the Feast of Our Lord's Presentation in the Temple, by Mary and Joseph, and being greeted by the elderly Simeon and Anna - the fortieth day after Christmas.

This is a Medieval tradition, maintained especially at Saint Peter's at the Vatican, where the crib remains in Saint Peter's Square until the fortieth day after Christmas. We will do the same in Saint Bride's again this year.

THE JOURNEY OF MAGI by T.S. ELLIOT

A cold coming we had of it, just the worst time of the year for a journey, and such a long journey: the ways deep and the weather sharp, the very dead of winter.'

And the camels galled, sore-footed, refractory, lying down in the melting snow.

There were times we regretted the summer palaces on slopes, the terraces.

Then the camel men cursing and grumbling and running away, and wanting their liquor and women,

and the night-fires going out, and the lack of shelters,

and the cities hostile and the towns unfriendly,

and the villages dirty and charging high prices: a hard time we had of it.

At the end we preferred to travel all night, sleeping in snatches, with the voices singing in our ears, saying that this was all folly.

Then at dawn we came down to a temperate valley, wet, below the snow line, smelling of vegetation; with a running stream and a water-mill beating the darkness, and three trees on the low sky, and an old white horse galloped away in the meadow.

Then we came to a tavern with vine-leaves over the lintel, six hands at an open door dicing for pieces of silver, and feet kicking the empty wine-skins.

But there was no information, and so we continued and arriving at evening, not a moment too soon finding the place; it was (you might say) satisfactory.

All this was a long time ago, I remember, and I would do it again, but set down this, set down this: were we led all that way for Birth or Death? There was a Birth, certainly we had evidence and no doubt. I had seen birth and death, but had thought they were different; this Birth was hard and bitter agony for us, like Death, our death.

We returned to our places, these Kingdoms, but no longer at ease here, in the old dispensation, with an alien people clutching their gods. I should be glad of another death.
