HAMMER OF HERETICS AND FINDER OF LOST THINGS...

n our parish Church, there is a beautiful carved wooden statue of Saint Anthony of Padua, which was donated by the Wright family, in memory of their father, who was Provost of East Kilbride. Anthony is one of the most popular saints of the Church - anyone who has attended the weekly Novena service, asking for his intercession. in Blessed John Duns Scotus Church in the Gorbals, will testify to that. Who was Anthony and why is he numbered among the greatest of the saints of the Church?

Born in Lisbon, into the noble family of Martins de Bulhões, he was baptised Fernando, in 1193. The family lived very near the Cathedral of Santa Maria Maior (Saint Mary Major), and it was within its precincts that he received his schooling, and from its cloisters that a vocation arose - at the age of fifteen, he joined the Augustinian Order, at the Abbey of Saint Vincent, as a novice. Here he became well-versed in the Sacred Scriptures and the Fathers of the Church (the great writers of the Church up until the end of the eighth century). There was one problem -because he was so well-known in Lisbon, he was visited by a constant stream of friends; so he asked to be transferred to the Monastery of Santa Cruz (Holy Cross) at Coimbra, then the capital of Portugal.



In 1219 he was ordained to the Priesthood and named magister hospitum (guest master) in the monastery; in this role he encountered five Franciscans who were on their way to Morocco to preach to Muslims there. Within a few months, these priests were martyred for the faith and their remains brought back to Portugal.

Fernando was so taken with their heroism, that he asked to join the Franciscan Order. He was received and given the name Anthony, after the

third century saintly hermit of Egypt whose feast day is 17th January each year. Soon after, he sailed to Morocco, but he became very sick, and his ship had to return. As Divine Providence would dispose, a storm blew his ship off course, and it landed on the island of Sicily.

Here Anthony joined with some Franciscans who were heading to Assisi for the General Chapter of the Order. Once there, he met Saint Francis of Assisi, who appointed him to a hermitage at Montepaolo. No-one knew of his learning, and Anthony was happy to carry out the most menial tasks for those entrusted to his care, while devoting himself to prayer to life of prayer.

In 1222, the Provincial brought Anthony with him to an Ordination of some Franciscans and Dominicans at Forli. When the Dominican preacher did not turn up, they asked Anthony to say a few words. Beginning tentatively, it soon became clear that here was a man of extraordinary knowledge and eloquence. But it was his holiness that moved those present most. As a result, he was asked to preach more widely, and Saint Francis appointed him as the Order's first lecturer in theology.

Anthony taught first in northern Italy and then in the south of France, where he went to assist in the crusade against the Albigensian heresy, (Albigensianism, also known as Catharism, was a dualistic movement that emerged in France in the thirteenth century. They believed in the battle between good [spirit] and evil [matter], shunning all kinds of material possessions). Anthony preached in the churches and squares of Toulouse, Montpellier and Arles, the power of this preaching earning him the nickname malleus haereticorum, (the hammer of heretics). Speaking in a loud, clear voice, he had a winning manner and a wonderful memory, and although he spoke out against luxury and greed, he did so positively, by presenting the beauty of the Christian way to his listeners.

Anthony spent his last years at Padua in northeastern Italy, where he had extraordinary influence both in the religious and civic life of town: reducing crime, freeing debtors from prison, feeding the poor, and reconciling enemies. He died in Padua aged thirty-six and was canonised by Pope Gregory IX, less than a year after his death. The large Basilica built over his tomb, has become an international shrine visited by millions of pilgrims annually.

Artists have frequently depicted Anthony with the Child Jesus on his arm, or carrying a Bible, or holding a lily (symbol of purity). Since the sixteenth century, people have been praying to Saint Anthony to recover lost objects. This stems from the story that in the Monastery, a novice borrowed his Book of Psalms, more properly called a Psalter, without permission, and had to return it because of a rather fearful vision of Anthony looking for his Psalter everywhere. The texts of many of sermons survive - it was for these, and his reputation as a Biblical scholar, that in 1946, Pope Pius XII named him a Doctor of the Church.

People traditionally bring lilies to Church to be blessed on his feast. I will do after the 10am Mass on Friday for anyone who would wish. Father McGachey

Jewish world. It was Barnabas who presented Saint Paul to the other Apostles when, after his conversion on the road to Damascus, he came to Jerusalem. Barnabas was Paul's helper on his first missionary journey and returned with him to Jerusalem but left him when he set out on his second journey and went to Cyprus.
