## THE BIRD, THE TREE, THE FISH, THE BELL...

### The miracles of Saint Mungo

**S**aint Kentigern, or Mungo as he is more popularly known, the Patron Saint of Glasgow is remembered in the Church's calendar on Tuesday, the 13<sup>th</sup> of January.



According to the *Life of Saint Mungo* written by the Cistercian monk, Jocelin of Furness (+1214), in 1185, Mungo's mother was Princess Enoch (+ c. 7<sup>th</sup> century). Some historians believe that Saint Enoch's Square, Glasgow, is the site of her burial. Saint Enoch was the daughter of Loth, the King of Lothian (+ c.603), who ruled the area we call East Lothian today. After an illicit encounter with her cousin, the King Owain (+ c. 595), now part of Galloway, the Princess fell pregnant.

Her furious father had her tied to a chariot, hoping for her death. The chariot, however, stopped gently, hurting neither Enoch nor her unborn child. Her father, believing her to be a witch, then cast her adrift in a coracle on the River Forth. She drifted up-river and came ashore at Culross in Fife, where Kentigern was born in 528.

He was given the name 'Mungo' meaning 'dear one', by Saint Serf (+583), who had founded a monastery at Culross. Serf, feeling compassion for the abandoned mother and her child, invited them to stay in the precincts of the Monastery. Serf would oversee Mungo's education and spiritual formation.

At the age of twenty-five, Mungo began his missionary work on the banks of the River Clyde. Here he was welcomed by the people who had been converted to Christianity by Saint Ninian (+432). Mungo would build a Church in the place, close to the confluence of the River Clyde and the Molendinar Burn. Since the 1200s, the site of this Church has formed part of Glasgow Cathedral, next to the Glasgow Royal Infirmary.

Mungo worked on the banks of the Clyde for thirteen years until the anti-Christian King, Morken of Strathclyde (+ c. 570), drove him out in 565. Mungo made his way to Cumbria and from there to Wales, where he spent time with Saint David (+589) and possibly founded a Cathedral at Saint Asaph (Llanelwy). During his exile, he was able to make a pilgrimage to Rome.

In 570, King Rhydderch Hael of Strathclyde (+614), having overthrown Morken, invited Mungo to become the Bishop of Strathclyde. Mungo initially based himself in northern Galloway, but later returned to the Clydeside, where his Church, which had become known as Clasgu or 'dear family', flourished. From these beginnings, the city of Glasgow emerged. It was at Clasgu that Mungo was visited by Saint Columba (+597), who at the time was working as a missionary in central Scotland. Mungo died in Glasgu on the 13<sup>th</sup> of January 614. He was buried close by his Church - his tomb is believed to lie in lower level of Glasgow Cathedral.

Many colourful legends grew-up around Mungo's life. He is said to have performed four miracles or wonders, referred to in the famous *Glasgow Riddle* or *Glasgow Rhyme*:

**'Here is the bird that never flew. Here is the tree that never grew.  
Here is the bell that never rang. Here is the fish that never swam.'**

In the first miracle, he is said to have restored life to a pet robin that belonged to Saint Serf. It had been killed by some of Mungo's classmates, hoping to blame him for its death. He prayed over the robin and brought it back to life again. The 'tree that never grew' refers to an episode when Mungo, supposed to be tending a fire, fell asleep. Some of his fellow pupils, who were envious of Mungo's favoured position with Serf, extinguished the fire while he slept. Upon waking, Mungo seeing the problem, broke some branches from a frozen hazel tree, and praying over them, was able to kindle the fire again. The hazel branches were transformed into a fully grown tree. The 'fish that never swam' is about Queen Languoreth of Strathclyde, who had been accused of infidelity by her husband, King Riderich. He alleged she had given her wedding ring to a lover, when, in reality, the king had thrown the ring into the river himself. Fearing execution, the Queen appealed to Saint Mungo, who ordered a fellow monk to catch a fish from the river. When the fish was cut open, the ring was found inside, showing the Queen's innocence. The 'bell' refers to a bell that had been given him by the Pope when he travelled to Rome. It was used for calling the faithful to services and marking the passing of the dead. The original bell now lost was replaced by a later version which can be seen in the People's Palace Museum.

Today the bird, tree, fish and the bell. form the four elements of the crest of Glasgow City Council (see previous page).

Saint Mungo is also responsible for the original motto of the City of Glasgow, based on a prayer he wrote: 'Lord, let Glasgow flourish through the preaching of thy word and praising thy name.' The more secular phrase: 'Let Glasgow Flourish' is Glasgow's motto today.
